
COLLECTION REVIEW

Collection development in libraries refers to the process of selecting, acquiring, managing, and maintaining the library's collection of resources—such as books, journals, digital materials, and audiovisual content—to meet the needs and interests of its patrons. It ensures that the library's resources are relevant, current, and in alignment with its mission and the community it serves.




OUR FOCUS

- Best-Sellers: A focus on popular books and current best-sellers, such as recent literary fiction, popular non-fiction, or books that are currently trending on platforms like Goodreads or the New York Times Best Sellers list.
- Trending Genres: A collection that highlights genres with a lot of attention, like young adult (YA) fiction, true crime, fantasy, sci-fi, or self-help books. The library could switch out collections periodically based on what's trending in these categories.
- Current Media: Adding books that are tied to popular media (e.g., movies, TV shows, or podcasts). This can include adaptations of popular shows or books that are being made into films.
- Local Popularity: Focusing on authors, topics, or genres that are particularly popular within the local community. We keep track of what books are checked out the most and adjust their collections accordingly.
